Overview

Location

Fort Stewart is located in Hinesville, a small coastal Georgia town in Liberty County. The location allows for a close community setting; as well as, access to all the amenities of Historic Savannah, Georgia. Hinesville is a rustic setting nestled a short distance from the Atlantic Coastline and approximately 41 miles southwest of the city of Savannah. Fort Stewart is the largest Army installation east of the Mississippi river. It covers 279,270 acres, which include parts of six counties. The cost of living in the area is moderate. Fort Stewart is easily accessible from Interstates 95 and 16. The base operator's phone number is 912-767-1411 or DSN 312-870-1411.

History

Fort Stewart traces its history back to November 1940, when the Anti-Aircraft Artillery Training Center was officially designated as Camp Stewart, in honor of General Daniel Stewart, a native of Liberty County who fought with Francis Marion (the Swamp Fox) during the Revolution. Since then, Fort Stewart's size and strategic location led to important roles in our Nation's defense. On April 25, 1996, the 3d Infantry Division was activated at Fort Stewart. Mission

Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield are the Army's world-class training, and military armored power projection combination on the eastern seaboard of the United States. This dynamic platform allows military units in the region to deploy rapidly throughout the world. The U.S. Army Garrison at Fort Stewart is responsible for organizing, directing, coordinating and controlling garrison support and service activities, including overall management of the garrison workforce. The command is composed of numerous directorates and organizations responsible for the daily operation of Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. The garrison command provides support to assigned, attached and tenant units or activities to include on-post units and activities in the assigned geographic area.

Population Served

Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield serve about 21,000 Soldiers, 29,500 Family Members, over 3,500 civilians, and National Guard Soldiers making for a small but active city. There are about 18,200 retirees in a 50-mile radius of the installation.

Base Transportation

Base transportation is not currently provided by this installation. However, taxicabs are authorized to transport Soldiers and Family Members on and off post.

Sponsorship

The Fort Stewart Sponsorship Program requires every Soldier, sergeant (E-5) through Colonel (O-6), receiving an assignment to Fort Stewart, be provided a sponsor. To get the benefits of the Sponsorship Program, Soldiers must fill out the DA Form 5434 (Sponsorship Program Counseling and Information Sheet). The program also provides that every effort be made to provide a pinpoint assignment and facilitate an advance-arrival for all married Soldiers in the grade of E1 through E4. A reactionary sponsor will be provided for these Soldiers if a pinpoint assignment and advance-arrival sponsor cannot be provided. A reactionary sponsor for single Soldiers in grade E1 through E4 will also be provided.

Whether being assigned to Fort Stewart or Hunter Army Airfield (HAAF), all must sign in at Fort Stewart. Wounded Soldiers and MEDDAC Soldiers check-in at Mower Processing Center which is located on Harmon Avenue. All other Soldiers check-in at the Marne Reception Center at the intersection of Harmon Avenue, Hase Road and Pony Soldier Avenue on Fort Stewart. Contact the Marne Reception Center at 912-767-0113 for questions or other concerns. A few days will be spent here for initial in-processing. Please check with the Post Locator for the holding of early arrival of mail; I.D. cards must be shown. The Post Locator is located in the same building as the post office, Building 418. As soon as an exact unit is assigned, complete in-processing at the mail room of unit. No matter the rank or the living arrangement, the unit's mail clerks need to know of the assignment.

Temporary Quarters

Soldiers and Family Members on official (PCS) and temporary duty (TDY) orders to and from the installation have priority at Army Lodging on the Installation. Reservations can be accepted up to one year in advance. Limited rooms are available for Soldiers with pets at Army Lodging. There is a nonrefundable fee of \$45 for pets and an additional charge of \$3 per night per pet. Up to date veterinarian records are required when checking in. Single and unaccompanied Soldiers, E1 through E4, will be assigned to a room in the post barracks.

Relocation Assistance

All incoming Soldiers and Family Members are invited to attend the Post Orientation and Tour every Tuesday and Thursday at 9:00 a.m. in the Soldier Service Center, Building 253. Additionally, Army Community Service has a lending closet that has a variety of basic household items for temporary loan at no charge to incoming and outgoing Families. Relocation counseling is also offered on a walk-in basis or by appointment to help incoming Soldiers and Family find services they need and discuss any other concerns they may have. If you need more relocation assistance, call Army Community Service at 912-767-5058.

Critical Installation Information

All incoming Soldiers without a defensive driving course card must complete the four hour course of instruction. Soldiers will be expected to have made living arrangements by the time they finish initial processing and report to assigned unit. Some assistance from Army Emergency Relief (AER) is available; however, monies should be budgeted in advance to avoid taking on new debt. Plan to pay move-in expenses such as initial rent, deposit, and utility connection fees. If you own a weapon, you must register it in accordance with Fort Stewart Regulation 109-2. The owner of the weapon must complete AFZP form 2027 at Building 419. Please **do not** bring any weapons into the registration office.

Cell Phone Usage

The use of cell phones while driving is prohibited on post, unless the use of the cellular phone is accomplished hands free. Violations are punishable by a \$50 fine or Uniform Code of Military Justice (UCMJ).

Sponsorship

Settling into your new location and your new unit takes time. [Plan My Move](#) is designed to assist you with information about your new location. Complimenting Plan My Move each of the military Services has a Sponsorship Program which is very helpful in providing new unit information. Sponsors can make your transition smoother. The purpose of the Sponsorship program is to:

- Provide a sense of belonging
- Ease the transition for inbound service members or civilians and their family members
- Increase productivity
- Reduce culture shock
- Help newcomers make informed decisions
- Cultivate new friendships
- Improve morale

A sponsor is someone from your new unit who is assigned to assist you settling into your new location. You must request a sponsor through your unit. You can learn more about the sponsorship program and how to apply through your Relocation Assistance Program or the Family Center at your new installation.

Your Service will appoint your sponsor in writing. He/she will be the same or close to your rank and the same marital status, if at all possible. This person will be knowledgeable about the local community and the installation; available to assist you and your family for at least two weeks post arrival, and be someone who is positive and outgoing.

A sponsor's duties include:

- Contacting you and your family by letter of introduction or e-mail upon learning of your assignment to the installation.
- Following up with a personal phone call after contact has been made.
- Sending information about the installation/area which you may require, or putting you in touch with the resources on the web and at the installation that provide current, complete and up-to-date information such as those provide by the Relocation Program.
- Answering any questions which you or your family may have, or, again, providing the proper resources to answer those questions.
- Confirm transportation and lodging arrangements.
- Assisting with obtaining a Post Office Box for your mail.
- Meeting you and your family upon arrival.
- Accompanying you to your check in point for the unit.
- Introducing you to the Family Center and lending closet
- Providing essential service locations such as commissary, exchange, gas station, and bank.
- Being available when you arrive at your installation to meet you, show you around, and help you through in-processing.

If you have not been assigned a sponsor, or have not been contacted as of yet, request one by contacting your gaining command or unit. If after contacting your new command you find difficulties in obtaining a sponsor, contact your Relocation Assistance Personnel for additional help with your move.

Service specific processes for requesting a Sponsor include:

- **Army and Defense Logistics Agency:** AR 600-8-8 outlines procedures for DA Form 5434, Sponsorship Program Counseling and Information Sheet. Sponsorship is mandatory for first term Soldiers. All Soldiers, private through colonel (excluding those completing advanced individual training (AIT) and those PCSing to long term schools) and civilian employees through grade 15 may participate in the advance arrival sponsorship program. Reactionary Sponsorship is available for individuals arriving at an installation without a sponsor. Contact the gaining unit to request a sponsor.
- **Air Force:** Gaining Unit Commander Support Staff/Military Personnel Element will assign a sponsor upon receipt of assignment notice. Assigned sponsor will then make contact with the inbound member.

- **Navy:** OPNAV INSTRUCTION 1740.3C prescribes procedures regarding Command Sponsor and Indoctrination Programs. This Program is designed to facilitate the adaptation of Sailors and their families into new working and living environments, to minimize the anxiety associated with a Permanent Change of Station (PCS) move, and afford Sailors and their families the greatest opportunity for a successful and productive tour of duty.

Command sponsor and indoctrination responsibilities begin upon receipt of PCS orders and continue until the Sailor has become an integral part of the new command and is fully cognizant of all policies, programs, services, and responsibilities available through the command. Commanding Officers shall establish a Command Indoctrination Program to include the delivery of the Navy Pride and Professionalism training per this instruction. COs should ensure all incoming personnel receive command indoctrination training within 30 days of arrival or within 3 drill weekends.

Enclosures (1) and (2) of OPNAVINST 1740.3C outline responsibilities and provide guidance for these programs. Assistance to local commands regarding the Command Sponsor Program is through the Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) Relocation Assistance Program staff.

- **Marine Corps:** Gaining Unit Commander will assign a sponsor on request. Overseas commands should assign a sponsor automatically, however if one is not assigned, send a request to the gaining command. A sample request form is available on our website that can be filled out and sent to the gaining command. See the following [website](#).

Sponsors' responsibilities and abilities to be available will vary from installation to installation, depending upon the priority which the installation and unit commanders give to the program; however, the Services are making the Sponsorship program a priority as research has shown the many benefits of good sponsorship to service, family members and youth.

Youth Sponsorship

The Youth Sponsorship Program depends on the availability of youth who volunteer to become sponsors. The Youth Services topic should explain the Youth Sponsorship program at your new installation, but if it does not answer all of your questions, contact your Relocation Manager to inquire about the program and acquiring a youth sponsor.

Directions to Installation

Airports

Savannah (Hunter Army Airfield) and Hinesville (Fort Stewart) are served by the Savannah/Hilton Head International Airport. The airport features a rest area/information center for incoming military personnel.

Transportation to Fort Stewart must be provided by Soldiers, with such means as car rental, commercial taxi, and on-site shuttle services. Otherwise, call the Replacement Detachment at 912-767-0115/0111/2690 or use the military phone at the airport to call directly to the 3D Infantry Division Replacement Detachment.

Driving Directions

From Savannah/Hilton Head International Airport to Fort Stewart, follow the signs from the airport to I-95 South. From 95, take the exit for GA Hwy 144 (Fort Stewart and Richmond Hill). Turn right at the off-ramp stop sign, and stay on 144 through post. Follow the signs to the Marne Reception Center.

Fort Stewart is located about 41 miles southwest of Savannah and readily accessible by way of the major East Coast Highways (U.S.17, I-16 and I-95). The major highway passing through Hinesville is U.S. 84. The routes to Fort Stewart from the east and west edges of town are clearly marked on this road.

Other Ways to Travel

Traveling by Bus

Savannah (Hunter Army Airfield) and Hinesville (Fort Stewart) are served by Greyhound Bus Company. The bus stop is located on Highway 84. To arrive at the main gate from the bus stop, turn right on Highway 84 and follow the signs to Fort Stewart.

Traveling by Train

Savannah and Jesup are served by Amtrak Rail System. Jesup is about 40 miles from Fort Stewart. From Jesup go East on Highway 84 and follow the signs for Fort Stewart.

When You Get To the Gate

The following items are required to obtain a pass or register a vehicle:

- Certificate of Registration
- Valid Driver's License
- Military /Civilian I.D. card or statement of employment from employer
- Proof of Insurance, Motorcycle Defensive Driving Course (MDDC) or Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) card for Motorcycles
- Valid Safety Inspection (if required by licensing state)

Check-in Procedures

Documents to Hand carry

You should hand carry your marriage and birth certificates, divorce decree, PCS orders, household goods inventory, Military ID cards, and any other Military Records you have.

Travel Planning

Temporary Lodging Reservations

Reservations with PCS orders can be made up to one year in advance and should be made as soon as possible. Space is limited as Army Lodging is a combination of 70 double rooms and 99 single rooms. Soldier must receive a Statement of Non-Availability before going to off-post lodging if compensation is desired. There are many hotels available in the immediate area.

Command Sponsorship

Concurrent travel is travel with Family Members. This must be authorized by your PCS order or reimbursement for Family travel will not be authorized. If you get married before you PCS, you **must** inform your commander and follow procedures exactly as they are given to you. The military **will not pay** for travel and housing of your spouse if you do not follow the proper procedures.

Reporting Procedures

Whether being assigned to Fort Stewart or Hunter Army Airfield, all Soldiers must sign in at the Reception Center on Fort Stewart unless you have specific directions to do otherwise. A few days will be spent in-processing. You will spend a few days here for initial in processing. Make sure to bring items listed under Documents to Hand Carry. Make sure to submit proper leave request prior to taking permissive leave for house hunting.

During inprocessing, Soldiers will get assignments and get briefings on Standards of Conduct and the Marine Standard. Files are screened to determine inprocessing requirements and a Preparation for Overseas Redeployment (POR) checklist is created. Spouses and other Family Members should attend the Family Member's Orientation which is every Tuesday and Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. in the Soldier Service Center, Bldg 253, 2nd floor Room 2074A. The orientation includes several speakers from agencies on post and also includes a tour of Fort Stewart and Hinesville. Free child care is available. Contact the Fort Stewart Childcare Center at 912-767-9662 to make arrangements ahead of time. Immunization records will be required for all children.

The sponsor's duty during inprocessing is to provide accurate, timely information and other support need to minimize problems with relocating. To get the benefits of the Sponsorship Program, Soldiers must fill out the DA Form 5434 (Sponsorship Program Counseling and Information Sheet).

Family Members inprocessing with service member or arriving at a later date should check-in with the ACS Outreach Program located at the Soldier Service Center.

What to do if you get married enroute?

If you get married before you PCS, you **must** inform your commander and follow procedures exactly as they are given to you. The military **will not pay** for travel and housing of your spouse if you do not follow the proper procedures.

Motor Vehicles

Registration & Licensing Requirements

Georgia State law requires you to have sufficient liability insurance and a valid driver's license in order to operate a vehicle. The term "vehicle" generally includes automobiles, motorcycles, vans, trailers and boats regularly parked or garaged overnight. Further, your vehicle must be properly registered. Even though you are in the Military, you may be required to register your vehicle in-state and obtain an in-state license within a few months of moving. Access complete information on insurance, driver's licensing, and where and how to register your vehicle by visiting the [State Department of Motor Vehicles](#) website.

State Laws

You and your passengers must always wear seatbelts while driving, you will be ticketed and issued heavy fines if seatbelts are not secured. State law requires that all children under 5 years of age and 57" in height be properly restrained in child seats. Some states also require younger, smaller children to sit in the back seat.

Motorcycles and their operators are subject to special laws. If you own and operate a motorcycle, you must comply with those laws. Visit the State Department of Motor Vehicles website for more information.

Many States and local jurisdictions have strict laws about the use of cell phones and other digital devices while driving. Research these laws on the State Department of Motor Vehicles website. Tickets will be issued and fines assessed for violating these laws. Play it safe and always use a "hands free" device if you must use a cell phone or other PDA while driving. Hands-free devices must be used while operating a motor vehicle on ALL military installations worldwide.

Education - General Overview

Introduction

DoD Schools

The Department of Defense Education Activity operates three elementary schools on Ft. Stewart. Each school has exceptional children programs. To be eligible to attend, parents must reside in family housing on the military installation. All schools are accredited by the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges and offer a wide range of instructional and support services. There are no middle or high schools on the installation. Children in grades 7-12 attend school in the local community. Bus transportation is provided depending on distance lived from school. Breakfast and lunch is offered on a free, reduced, or full priced fee schedule. Before and after school care is provided by School Age Services, not at the individual school. A variety of sports and extracurricular activities are provided through Child and Youth Services.

Local Schools

The Liberty County School System has two high schools, three middle schools, and eight elementary schools. There are also three private schools and 1 alternative school. All are accredited by the state. All the Liberty County public schools offer transportation for students to school based on distance lived from school. Breakfast and lunch is provided on a free, reduced or full price fee schedule. The Pryme Tyme program offered through the YMCA provides before and after school care at their respective schools for elementary school children. Each school offers before and after school, sports and exceptional student programs. You can ask about specific programs once you register or by going to the [Liberty County Schools webpage](#).

Local School and/or DoD schools

About 1,400 children are enrolled in the Fort Stewart Schools. The average student to teacher ratio is 13 students to one teacher. More than 11,000 children are enrolled in the Liberty County School System. The average teacher to student ratio is 15 students per teacher with some schools being more or less students per teacher. About 85% of 12th grade students receive a diploma. For those wishing to home school, check with the Homeschooling Association or the School Liaison office and the Liberty County Board of Education for specific curriculum and requirements.

Adult Education

For both Fort Stewart and Liberty County residents, adult education is provided through the Education Center. The Education center provides various opportunities for those wishing to further their education through various programs. Also located in Hinesville are two colleges, Savannah Tech and Brewton Parker.

Education - Local Schools

Choosing the right school for their children is a priority for military families. This article describes excellent resources for your use in planning for your child's educational needs. Parents can find current information about public, charter and private schools by using the tools below:

1. How do I choose a good school?

2. What schools are in my area (or in the area where I may move), and how good are they?

Several high quality commercial tools are available to assist in making decisions about which school to choose for your child. Listed below are these website tools along with information on how you access the information and what type of information each site provides.

Both [Great Schools](#) and [School Matters](#) provide a wealth of information for parents:

- School contact information
- Distance from zip code (provide the installation zip code, or the zip code of the area where you will be living)
- Public, private or charter school designation
- Student/teacher ratios
- Free and reduced school lunch program (an estimate of economic disadvantage)
- Great Schools provides a rating of schools and a parent comment section
- Percentage of students meeting or exceeding the state standards in math, reading and language arts
- Teachers - average number of years teaching experience, % of first year teachers on the staff
- Students: Average percentage of students absent from school for more than 15 days
- Ethnic breakdown and percent of students with English as a second language
- School Matters provides college prep scores (PSAT, SAT, ACT test scores)-for high schools only
- Great Schools also provides parents the ability to rate the schools and make comments on the schools.

For both sites, the user must enter the State and zip code to find schools in the area.

SchoolQuest was developed by the [Military Child Education Coalition](#) to help military families select schools. SchoolQuest also offers an Online Library that provides resources for families in transition. At this time, the SchoolQuest data base covers 99 military installations. The Military Child Education Coalition also provides a [data base of information](#) on each State's educational system.

[The School Report Tool](#) is available from Military OneSource that list names and locations of public, public charter, private, virtual and home schooling choices around major installations. [Charter Schools](#) are nonsectarian public schools of choice that operate with freedom from many of the regulations that apply to traditional public schools. Use this site to find one in your area.

3. How can I help plan for a successful transition in this new school and for my child's school career?

Parents often want to know about the availability of extra curricular activities and sports, or the availability of advanced classes. For these questions, it is best to contact the schools directly. It is important to ask the right questions. The following resources can help with these questions and others.

The [Toolkit for Parents](#) was developed by the Department of Defense, especially for Military Families. This 85 page booklet walks parents through preparing for the move and the first two weeks of school....what to ask, what to take, etc..

The [Military Impacted Association](#) has [checklists](#) available for military kids who are leaving or entering a new school.

The Military Child Education Coalition has a [checklist for transferring students](#) that will be helpful. Additionally, through [SchoolQuest](#), MCEC provides parents with the ability to develop a profile for each of their children, which then will provide them with a report on issues related to transferring to a new school district.

4. Question? What happens if I need help during the school year?

During the school year, there are always questions that parents have, such as "What is the best way to help with homework?" or "What if my child needs to see a counselor because my spouse is deployed?" Education - Local Schools/Overseas

Overseas Schools -- What You Should Know

Moving your family from one installation to another in the U.S. can be challenging enough; but moving your family overseas presents an even more complex situation. One of the most important challenges can be summed up by this question, "Where are my children going to go to school?"

This article will provide resources to help guide military families through the many questions and decisions regarding local schools abroad.

Where do I start?

Start with the information on your new installation. Visit [Plan My Move](#) and review the installation's Education - Overview article. All of the overseas installations have dedicated a portion of the Education Overview to discussing the education options available in the local community as well as the DoD schools located on the installation, if available. Most installations overseas that allow accompanied family travel have one or more DoD schools.

What is the difference between a DoD school and an international or national school?

[DoDEA](#) is the Department of Defense Education Activity. DoDEA operates DoD schools in 12 foreign countries, Guam and Puerto Rico. All DoDEA schools are fully accredited by U.S. accreditation agencies and maintain high academic standards with well rounded educational programs.

In addition to DoDEA, the [U.S. Department of State's Office of Overseas Schools](#) mission is to promote quality educational opportunities for dependents of American citizens overseas at the elementary and secondary level. If a DoD school is not available on your installation there may be a school in the local community that is an American-Sponsored Elementary and Secondary School.

International schools are English-language schools whereas National schools are schools where courses are taught in the native language. The curriculum and grading system of an International school tends to be similar to the traditional American education system. This is a consideration if your family will be returning to the U.S. prior to your child or children graduating high school. Remember, when choosing a school it is best to try to match the school with your child's needs and expectations.

Where can I find a list of International schools in the country where my family is moving?

The Internet can be an excellent resource for finding International Schools overseas. You can find a complete directory of overseas schools on the [International Schools Services' website](#).

In addition, the [World Wide Schools](#) website is an excellent resource. From the homepage you can select the country. Once you have done this, a list of schools will appear and you can then choose which one you are interested in researching. All of the information appearing on this website is provided by the schools directly. Some of the information you may find on a school includes: a background summary about the school, the school's address, phone number, website, and even the email address of the director of the school. This information should be explored so that you can make comparisons with other International schools in the area to determine the best place for your child/children.

How do I decide what school is best for my child?

This process is much the same as it would be in the U.S. You may not have as many choices but it is important to make a list of possible schools and then begin to ask around. This is a daunting task since it is likely that there will be a language barrier. However, talk to the Relocation Personnel in the Family Center and your sponsor at your new installation who may be able to put you in touch other families with children around the same age as your child/children. Always contact the school directly and ask for references.

Once you have narrowed down your options, interview the school or schools directly. This is best done in person, if possible. Ask about: attendance, atmosphere, curriculum; grading system, tuition, accreditations, the staff and administration; as well as other practical details such as, does the school provide meals, what types of extra curricular programs are available, is there transportation, holidays and schedule, sports programs, before and after school care programs, and how is the facility maintained.

Now that I have chosen a school, how do I successfully facilitate the transition for my child?

A successful transition should be a priority during planning the move and once the move has been completed. The more knowledge you provide your child with, the more confident he/she will feel once he/she arrives at the new school. Allow your child to be a part of the decision making process, if he/she is old enough, and take his/her opinions into account.

[MilitaryStudent](#) provides several valuable tools to facilitate the transition process. Although many of these tools are not geared specifically to an international move the resources provided do apply to any military student transitioning to a new school in the U.S. or overseas.

Education - Special Education/EIS

Special Education and EDIS

The Department of Defense provides services to children with developmental delays and disabilities according to the Individual with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Eligibility for services is determined according to procedures outlined in DoD Instruction 1342.12, Provision of Early Intervention and Special Education Services to Eligible DoD Dependents, April 11, 2005.

Infants and Toddlers (Birth to 3 years of age)

The Educational and Developmental Intervention Services (EDIS), a division of the Army military hospital, provides services to young children who meet the identified criterion for those services. The children's families must meet the housing requirements for their children to attend a Department of Defense stateside school.

The EDIS teams, with Early Childhood Special Educators and multi-disciplinary allied health professionals, assist families of infants and toddlers with developmental delays to achieve goals that enhance functional independence and support school readiness. EDIS provides services in the child's natural environment (home, childcare center, etc.), and embedded in family routines.

School Age Services (ages 3 through 21 years)

The Domestic Dependent Elementary and Secondary Schools (DDESS) provide special education at Ft. Stewart.

Brittin Elementary, Diamond Elementary, and Fort Stewart Elementary provide special education services to all eligible students whose families meet the housing requirements for their children to attend a Department of Defense stateside school.

All types of educational disabilities are represented in the special education population. The schools provide services in a variety of settings to include self-contained life-skills classrooms, resource special education, speech therapy classrooms, and within the general education classrooms.

Due to the small nature of the school system and geographical location, some specialized services for students may be contracted to the local public school or another agency. There has been some difficulty at times finding specific services, such as a vision specialist, to provide services in this area.

Four Year Old Preschool Program

All four year old children are eligible to attend a universal preschool program that operates in two of the elementary schools. This program is for all children who turn four years of age on or before the designated date of the respective school year. It is open to all eligible children whose families meet the housing eligibility requirements for their children to attend a Department of Defense stateside school. This is a half-day preschool program provided at no cost to the parents.

Special Education Records

Parents of children enrolled in special education should hand-carry copies of all pertinent school and medical documents, to include their children's Individualized Education Program (IEP) and current testing and evaluation reports, to provide to the new school.

It is helpful if parents call the Ft. Stewart School Superintendent's office in advance of their arrival so we can plan for a smooth transition to our schools.

Housing - Overview

Family Housing

Family Housing is privatized and operated by Balfour Beatty Community. Soldiers must apply for housing within 30 days of arrival. If housing is not available, an active waiting list by grade and number of bedrooms will be established. Waiting list will be posted at the Community Management Office as well as on the website. Waiting list size and time varies by season and number of incoming and outgoing Soldiers. The list will be updated weekly. There is no priority placement for Families with exceptional Family Members. Housing assignments will be determined by the amount of dependents and rank of service member. The rent allotment will equal the Soldiers BAH entitlement for their rank.

Pets

Two pets are authorized in Family housing and there is no additional charge. The following breeds are not permitted: Akitas, Boxers, Chows, Dobermans, Pit Bull, Rottweiler, American Staffordshire Terriers, English Staffordshire Bull Terriers, wolf hybrids or any other breed with dominant traits geared toward aggression. Exotic pets are not permitted in Family Housing which include but is not limited to snakes, rodents, and reptiles.

Availability

There will be a total of 3,027 homes at Fort Stewart and 675 at Hunter Army Airfield. The highest proportion of homes is for ranks E1-E6 with the lowest proportion allotted to officers. There are 11 neighborhoods with apartments or houses sized between 2 and 5 bedrooms.

Married Soldiers, regardless of grade, accompanied or not, are required to live off post unless or until on-post Family housing is available.

If you are taking permissive TDY for house hunting, be sure to have your leave form (DA form 31) stamped by the Housing Referral Office before starting permissive TDY. If not, you may be charged leave for that period.

Single Service Member Housing

Single and unaccompanied Soldiers (E1 to E4) will be assigned a room in the post barracks during inprocessing. Rooms will be shared with one other Soldier. In some instances, E4s are allowed to live off-post with special permission. Ask your chain of command if this is an option.

Single and unaccompanied NCOs (E5 and above) may live on or off-post. Be sure to check with your chain of command as some units require their NCOs to live on-post. You will be required to live off-post when the amount of E1 to E4 has exceeded their occupancy capacity. Housing and subsistence allowances are authorized should this occur. You will be expected to have made off-post living arrangements by the time you finish initial in-processing and report to your unit. A list of suitable off post housing is available through the Off Post Housing Referral office in the Soldier Service Center. Although you may be eligible for some assistance from Army Emergency Relief, you should budget your money now to avoid taking on new debt to pay such move-in expenses as initial rent, deposits, and utility connection fees.

Exceptional Family Member Housing

There are an allotted number of adaptable and wheelchair accessible homes provided. Priority is not given for special needs Families as the services on the installation are provided in the local community. Floor plans of wheelchair accessible housing are available on the [website](#). Housing units are air conditioned. Generators are not provided for Families with significant medical needs that require power for medical equipment.

Non-Government Housing

All Soldiers reporting to Fort Stewart are required to process through the Housing Referral Office before renting or buying a home off-post. There is always housing available to accommodate any budget. The office provides assistance and guidance to military personnel and DOD civilians in finding suitable, affordable off post housing.

Housing Referral Office (HRO)

Contact the HRO at the Soldier Service Center for any problems encountered, such as discrimination complaints, tenant/landlord disputes, or any questions or problems about off-post housing. The HRO will provide you a list of rentals with corresponding locator maps and give you information regarding the communities in which the rentals are located. All renters should carry renters insurance against fire, theft and other damages. The property owner's insurance will cover the property but not the renter's personal property.

The HRO maintains a listing of available rentals, brief individuals on the local area, review/clarify or explain lease contracts, mediate disputes between tenants and landlords, inspect off-post rental housing for suitability, obtain assurance of non-discriminatory rental practices, maintain a display of area maps, rental/sales booklets and brochures, and provide information on the deposit waiver program.

Rental Options DoD Automated Housing Referral Network (AHRN)--Visit AHRN.com or ask at your local housing office to learn about this DoD program that is currently available for most installations. The program allows military members and families to:

- Search listings and pictures of available rentals near military installations
- Find out about shared rentals
- List their own properties for rent to other military families
- List their homes for sale by owner (FSBO) to other military members
- Contact installation housing offices

AHRN is not currently available at all installations but the phased program is adding new installations every month. Check the AHRN [website](#) to see if your next assignment is an AHRN base and check out other features to assist you in your home search.

Rental Options

Rental Rates in the immediate Hinesville area vary widely depending on any number of factors. Mobile Homes range from \$250 to \$950 depending on size. Apartments range from \$400 to \$800 depending on size. Townhouses/Condos range from \$400 to \$1200 depending on size. Houses range from \$525 to \$2000 plus depending on size and extras. Furnished units may cost extra.

Purchase Options

The surrounding communities have various types of housing for sale, including single family homes, condos, townhouses, duplexes and mobile homes.

As with rent, the prices of homes for sale vary widely. Mobile Homes range from \$20,000 to \$55,000, Townhouses/Condos range from \$35,000 to \$65,000, and Houses range from \$55,000 to \$300,000. Soldiers can visit the Veterans Administration (VA) at the Soldier Service Center, building 253 to determine if they qualify for a VA Home Loan.

Mobile Homes

Ft. Stewart does not have a mobile home park. However, there are several mobile home parks off post. Mobile Home rent ranges from \$250 to \$550 depending on size, purchase prices range from \$20,000 to \$55,000. Check with Housing Referral Office at the Soldier Service Center prior to purchasing a home. You can contact the office at 912-767-2127.

Housing - Temporary

Temporary Lodging Facility

Fort Stewart Army Lodging

Eligibility/Orders

ID card holders and their families are eligible to stay at Lodging. Orders are required for PCS moves. Families can stay up to 30 days when relocating. Extensions can be granted under special circumstances. Rooms for leisure travel can be reserved up to 7 to 14 days in advance; maximum stay is 3 days and can be extended if rooms are available. Soldiers/Families with official orders have priority.

Availability/Cost/Registration

Reservations can be accepted up to one year in advance for Soldiers on orders. Rooms are "space available" for leisure travel and availability changes depending on the season. Rooms for leisure travel can be reserved up to 7 to 14 days in advance.

Maximum Length of Stay

Families can stay up to 30 days when relocating but an extension can be granted under special circumstances. Maximum length of stay for leisure travel is 3 days and can be extended if rooms are available.

Location

Ft. Stewart Lodging is located in building 4951 across the street from Club Stewart. To make reservations call 912-368-4184 or DSN 312-870-8384.

Pets

A limited amount of rooms are available at Army Lodging for soldiers with pets. There is a nonrefundable fee of \$45 for pets and an additional charge of \$3 per night per pet. Up to date health and shot records are required when checking in. Some off-post hotels may accept pets for a nonrefundable fee. Make reservations ahead of time and make sure there are accommodations for your pet. Fort Stewart has a new Pet Boarding facility located on the installation. Please call 912-435-5052 for more information. There are also kennels off post if your pet needs to be boarded. Make sure pets have current shots and call ahead to make sure all necessary paperwork assembled to have pets boarded off post. Pets on the restricted list will not be allowed to stay at Army Lodging. Please see Housing Overview for a list of restricted pets.

Overseas Clearance/Special Needs

Stewart Lodging is handicap accessible. Call ahead to make sure a handicap accessible room is available for your stay. Baby beds and high chairs are provided at no charge upon request.

Green Roof Inn

Rooms in this facility are two person rooms which means that your price is for half of a room that will be shared with another guest. Rooms include cable television, microwave, refrigerator, and coffee pot. Housekeeping is done Monday through Friday until 5:00 p.m.

Eligibility/Orders

This facility is mainly used by National Guard and student soldiers. Facility may also be used by single active duty, geographical bachelors, and families on a space available basis. National Guard and student soldiers have highest priority. No orders are needed to make reservations or stay at the Green Roof Inn.

Availability/Costs/Reservations

Space is usually available for National Guard due to priority level. Active duty, geographical bachelors and families can reserve rooms if they are available. If National Guard or student soldiers are scheduled come after you check-in and there are not enough rooms available, you may be asked to check out earlier than planned. Costs are \$17 for National Guard and \$22 for all others per night. Advance reservation is required. If you are planning to arrive after 4p.m during the week or on the weekends, you need to make arrangements ahead of time as the office closes at 4:00 p.m. during the week and is closed on the weekends. When making reservations, be sure to let them know if you are bringing family as this will determine room assignment.

Maximum Length of Stay

There is no maximum stay period.

Location

The Green Roof inn is located on 10th and 11th street of Fort Stewart. Registration is in Building 10506 or by calling 912-448-4085.

Pet Restrictions

No pets accepted.

Overseas Clearance/ Special needs

Handicap accessible rooms are limited so call ahead to make sure accommodations are available.

Camping Facility

A camp site at Holbrook Pond is available through outdoor recreation for rates ranging from \$6-15 per day. Campsites are concrete slabs with water and electrical hookups. There is a central bathhouse and sewage dump station on the grounds. Make your reservations early by calling 912-767-2771/2717. Hours of operation are from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The Camping Reservations Office is in building 8325 and the camp site is off of highway 144. There is no limit to how long you can stay.

Housing - Government

Family Housing

Availability

On Fort Stewart, Family Housing consists of 3,027 units divided into 11 neighborhoods with size ranging from 2-5 bedrooms. Waiting time depends on date of eligibility and number of rooms needed. See contact section for location and contact information.

Eligibility

If Fort Stewart is your first duty station then your date of eligibility begins when you sign into the Military. If you are on Permanent Change of Station (PCS) orders, your date of eligibility is the day you clear your old duty station.

Application Procedures

To apply for housing, applications are available online as well as in the office. Complete and submit the online application or print the application from online and fax it to the office. Or, upon arriving at Fort Stewart bring the application into the housing office with the following items: military I.D., Leave and Earnings Statement (LES), copy of orders, and Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) form or birth certificate for all children living in quarters. Either way, when you get to Fort Stewart you will need to bring into the housing office a military I.D. card, Leave and Earnings Statement (LES), Copy of orders, and Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) form or birth certificate for all children living in quarters. Other Options

There are no mobile home parks on the installation. The government does not have any leased housing in the community for soldiers to rent.

Single Service Member Housing

Availability

Barracks are distributed once a soldier is assigned to a unit. There are enough rooms to accommodate incoming soldiers.

Eligibility

Single Soldiers E-1 - E-5 are eligible to stay in the barracks. Some married soldiers may be eligible to stay in barracks under certain circumstances. To determine eligibility, contact the reception center at 912-767-0113.

Application Procedures

There is no application process to stay in the barracks. When you arrive at the reception center and are assigned to a unit, you will be assigned a room in the barracks if you are eligible.

Household Goods - Overview

Arranging Household Goods Shipments

As soon as you are alerted to your upcoming PCS move, you can start getting your house and family ready. Clean up and get rid of junk. Hold a yard sale or take serviceable items you no longer need to a thrift shop or donate to charity. Get important family records together in one place. You can even [estimate the weight](#) of your household goods before you visit your transportation office to set up the move. If you are going overseas, you should begin to plan what items you will take in your unaccompanied baggage, in your household goods shipment, and what might need to go into permanent storage. Remember for overseas assignments, electricity is different and houses are generally much smaller and cannot handle large furniture.

Set up an appointment with your transportation office as soon as you have a copy of your PCS orders. The earlier you call or visit your transportation office, the greater your chances of moving on the date you desire. The transportation office may instruct you to use the government's [new automated moving system](#) and process, DP3. The counselors will explain all your PCS move entitlements in detail. Your first decision is whether to have the government move you or whether to move yourself. There are pros and cons to each type of move. Your counselor will answer all of your questions. If you choose a government move, they will book your shipment and put you in contact with your mover (Transportation Service Provider - TSP). The TSP will contact you for a pre-move survey and let you know the exact dates the movers will come. If you choose to move yourself, the counselor can assist with recommendations and tips on how to do a personal move.

Automobile

The government may ship one Privately Owned Vehicle (POV) at their expense to your new overseas location. This is handled through your transportation office. Remember to discuss your POV needs at your initial counseling session. The shipping contractor has established a [website](#) where you can track the location of your POV through the shipping process.

Shipping Pets

Planning for shipment of your pet includes researching airline requirements, and quarantine restriction laws in your new location. You will need to ask the airlines the requirements for size, weight, number of animals, kennel construction, documentation and season of the year limitations. Occasionally, small pets can be shipped on military flights but availability and regulations are always changing as well as fees. Check the [DoD Household Goods Portal website](#) for details on shipping pets.

Many international locations have strict importation laws including extended quarantines and restrictions on breeds or types of animals that can be brought into the country. Carefully research these rules as they could impact your moving schedule. Not only do overseas locations have strict rules but many locations have restrictions on dangerous dogs as well. Review your destination installation's Shipping Pets article for details.

Arrival and Delivery of Household Goods Shipments

Follow the instructions you are given at counseling carefully. Depending on how your shipment moves, it is your responsibility to contact the transportation office or mover (TSP) as soon as you arrive at your new duty station. Let them know how you can be contacted, phone, mobile phone and e-mail. If you already have new quarters, they will help arrange delivery of your personal property shipments. Otherwise they will arrange for temporary storage until you have permanent housing.

Make certain that you, or someone who can act in your name, is available at your new home on delivery day. If the TSP arrives and cannot deliver the shipment, you may be charged for the attempted delivery and any additional storage that may result.

Customer Satisfaction Survey

Once your personal property is delivered, you'll be asked to rate your satisfaction with the customer service you received from the TSP. Make sure you take the time to do this. Your feedback will make the process better for everyone. The SDDC website provides detailed information about [completing the Customer Satisfaction Survey](#).

Claims

DoD customers are eligible for Full Replacement Value (FRV) protection on most DoD sponsored shipments. With this protection, the TSP will either repair or pay to repair damaged items and pay the full replacement cost for items that are lost or destroyed.

Providing prompt notice of loss or damage is an essential part of the process. Use the front of [DD Form 1840/1840R](#) to notify the mover of any loss or damage you find at the time of delivery. If further loss or damage is discovered after the transportation provider departs, use the reverse side of the form, DD Form 1840R. You must **file DD Form 1840/1840R with the TSP within 75 days of delivery**. The TSP has the right to inspect the damaged item once they receive the notice forms.

If you have any loss or damage to your personal property you will need to file a claim. Completing and submitting the DD Form 1840/1840R does not constitute filing a claim. You must file the claim directly with the TSP within nine months of delivery to receive FRV protection. Once the claim is filed directly with the TSP, the TSP is responsible for obtaining repair and replacement estimates and settling the claim by paying repair or replacement costs.

As in the past, the Military Claims Office (MCO) is available to help you understand the claims process and your rights and responsibilities. You may still transfer your claim to the MCO if you wish. However, if you transfer your claim the MCO will only be responsible for the lower depreciated cost of items on the claim.

Household Goods - Shipping Pets

Boarding

Boarding services are not available on the installation. Cost for boarding off post is between \$8-12 a day. Cost variation depends on animal's size, species, and if it is neutered or spayed. It is important to make boarding arrangements prior to arrival in the area to make sure space is available.

There is a Dog Kennel available on Fort Stewart, they can be contacted at 912-435-8052.

Transportation

Make sure your pet is in overall good health before traveling and that shots and vaccinations are current. If you are transporting your animal by air, check with the airline you plan to use to get specific information on travel requirements and restrictions for animals. Animal transportation may be restricted in the summer due to high temperatures or inclement weather. Occasionally, small pets can be shipped on military flights but availability and regulations are always changing as well as fees.

Vaccinations, Licensing and Registration

All pets kept on post must be registered with the post veterinarian's office. Also, those residing off post must have up to date shots and licenses. Rabies Vaccinations are kept on file and a tag is issued with a corresponding number.

Veterinary Services

Veterinary care is provided for privately owned pets at the Veterinary Treatment Facility (VTF) by appointment only. Appointments are made on Thursday's beginning at 8:00 a.m. Emergency services are not provided for privately owned pets. In case of emergency, a civilian veterinarian should be consulted. Cash and personal checks are accepted for payment and payment is due upon completion of services. All domestic pets housed on Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield must be registered. There is no charge to register your pet. The VTF also operates a stray facility with animals available for adoption. New owners must pay for any vaccinations the animal requires. To report stray animals, contact the Military Police.

Health Care - Overview

Moving With TRICARE

Your [TRICARE](#) coverage is completely portable—meaning it moves with you. You're covered worldwide—both in transit to your new duty location and once you arrive—but depending on where you go you may use a different TRICARE health plan option. Additionally, you may have different steps depending on which health plan option you are using now.

When Enrolled in a TRICARE Prime Option

The TRICARE Prime options include TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Prime Remote in the United States, and TRICARE Prime Overseas and TRICARE Global Remote Overseas in regions outside of the United States. Follow these simple steps to ensure you have no break in coverage when you move.

1. Do not disenroll from your TRICARE Prime option before you move.
2. Once you arrive at your new location, update your personal information in the [Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System \(DEERS\)](#) immediately.
3. Select a new primary care manager (PCM), when moving within the same region or submit a new Prime enrollment form within 30 days if you're moving to a new region.

Where you are moving will determine which Prime option you will enroll in.

Prime Options in the United States

TRICARE Prime

TRICARE Prime is offered in Prime service areas—geographic areas typically located around a military treatment facility—throughout the country.

If you move to a new Prime service area, transfer your enrollment by submitting a TRICARE Prime Enrollment and PCM Change Form to your regional contractor. Be sure to include all family members who wish to use Prime on the form.

TRICARE Prime Remote

In non-Prime service areas, TRICARE offers TRICARE Prime Remote. To enroll, submit a TRICARE Prime Enrollment and PCM Change Form to your regional contractor. Any TRICARE-eligible family members living with you in a TRICARE Prime Remote area can enroll in TRICARE Prime Remote for Active Duty Family Members. Be sure to include them on the enrollment form.

Prime Options Outside of the United States

TRICARE Prime Overseas

TRICARE Prime Overseas is offered in overseas areas where there are military treatment facilities or areas in which TRICARE has established a network of qualified host nation providers.

If you move to an area in which TRICARE Prime Overseas is offered, transfer your enrollment by submitting a TRICARE Prime Enrollment Form to the nearest TRICARE Service Center. Command-sponsored family members who reside with you are eligible for TRICARE Prime Overseas. Be sure to include all family members who wish to use TRICARE Prime Overseas on the form.

TRICARE Global Remote Overseas

TRICARE Global Remote Overseas is a Prime option offered in designated remote overseas locations. If you move to an area in which TRICARE Global Remote Overseas is offered, you and any authorized family members living with you may enroll by submitting a TRICARE Prime Enrollment Form to the nearest TRICARE Service Center.

Before you move to another overseas area or to an area within the United States, contact the nearest TRICARE Service Center. Then, when you arrive in your new area, transfer your enrollment.

When Using TRICARE Standard and Extra

TRICARE Standard and Extra are available to family members only. Active duty service members are required to enroll in one of the Prime options described above.

TRICARE Standard and Extra are available throughout the United States and enrollment is not required. Any active duty family member who is registered in DEERS may use these programs by seeing any network or non-network providers that are authorized by TRICARE. In areas outside of the United States, active duty family members who don't want to use a Prime option may use TRICARE Standard Overseas by seeing qualified host nation provider.

If you're already using TRICARE Standard and Extra, moving is easy.

1. Once you arrive at your new location, update your personal information in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) immediately.
2. Then, find TRICARE-authorized providers in your new area.

Here are a few things to remember about using TRICARE Standard and Extra in a new region

- In the U.S.: Visit your new regional contractor's Web site for a list of providers. Remember, if you see network providers, you'll be using the Extra option and pay lower copayments.
- Outside of the U.S.: Contact your TRICARE Service Center for help locating a qualified host nation provider. The TRICARE Extra option is not available in overseas areas.
- If you move to a new region, you'll have a new claims address for submitting your TRICARE claims.
- Learn your new region's prior authorization requirements because these requirements can differ by region.

When Using TRICARE For Life

TRICARE For Life—TRICARE's coverage for those who are eligible for Medicare—requires no enrollment and you'll have a smooth transition when you move. [TRICARE for Life](#) contact information: WPS TRICARE For Life, P.O. Box 7889, Madison, WI 53707-7889; 1-866-773-0404; TDD 1-866-773-0405

- Once you arrive at your new location, update your personal information in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) immediately.
- Find Medicare providers in your new area.

If you move overseas, your TRICARE For Life coverage may change depending on where you move. In U.S. Territories such as Guam, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands, TRICARE For Life coverage works the same as the stateside program. But, in all other overseas locations, TRICARE For Life Overseas works differently because Medicare does not provide coverage in most overseas locations. Therefore, TRICARE is the primary payer. You can get care from any host nation provider and you will be responsible for TRICARE deductibles and cost shares.

Contact the TRICARE Area Office for the overseas area where you are moving or the nearest American Embassy Health Unit for assistance finding a host nation provider.

Getting Care Along the Way

- Routine Medical and Dental Care—Get it before you go.

Before you move, make sure you've received any routine medical or dental care you think you might need during the time you'll be traveling. Or, delay the care until you get to your new duty location.

- Emergency Care in the United States—Call 911 or go to the nearest emergency room.

TRICARE defines emergency care as medical services provided for a sudden or unexpected medical or psychiatric condition, or the sudden worsening of a chronic (ongoing) condition that is threatening to life, limb, or sight and needs immediate medical treatment, or which has painful symptoms that need immediate relief to stop suffering. If you're traveling near a military treatment facility (MTF), you should go to the MTF or military dental treatment facility for emergency services. If you are hospitalized in a civilian facility for more than 24 hours, contact your regional contractor.

- Urgent care in the United States—Coordinate with your PCM and/or regional contractor.

TRICARE defines urgent care as medical care for a condition that will not result in disability or death if not treated immediately but should be treated within 24 hours to avoid further complications. If you are in a Prime program, you must coordinate urgent care with your primary care manager and/or regional contractor before receiving care. If you are in TRICARE Standard and Extra or TRICARE For Life, you can receive care as you normally would. You should, however, contact your contractor as soon as possible to coordinate any prior authorizations that are needed.

- Emergency or Urgent care Overseas—Contact closest TRICARE Area Office or TRICARE Global Remote Call Center.

You don't need prior authorization for emergency or urgent care but the TRICARE Area Office or TRICARE Global Remote Call Center will help you find the best care available in the overseas area in which you are traveling.

Filling Prescriptions on the Road

You should have all your prescriptions filled before you leave, but if you need a prescription filled while you're traveling in the United States, you have several options:

- If near an MTF, fill the prescription at the MTF pharmacy.
- Find the closest TRICARE network pharmacy.
- If a network pharmacy is not available, you can visit a non-network pharmacy. In this case, you may have to pay up front for your medications and file a claim with Express Scripts, Inc., for reimbursement. For more details, visit the [TRICARE web site](#)
- The mail-order option is not recommended for a prescription you need right away, but if you'll be traveling for a long time, you can arrange for any regular prescriptions to be filled via the mail-order pharmacy.

Your pharmacy coverage is limited overseas:

- TRICARE network pharmacies are only located in the United States, Puerto Rico, Guam and the U.S. Virgin Islands. You can have prescriptions filled at host-nation pharmacies, if necessary. Host-nation pharmacies are treated the same as non-network pharmacies. If you have prescriptions filled at a host-nation pharmacy, you should expect to pay for the total amount up front and file a claim with Wisconsin Physicians Service for partial reimbursement. To learn more about pharmacy claims, visit the [TRICARE web site](#).
- To use the mail-order pharmacy overseas, the prescription must be from a U.S. licensed provider and you must have an APO or FPO address.

Installation Specific Information

Medical Care

Winn Army Community Hospital (WACH) provides emergency and regular healthcare to active duty military personnel and their dependents. Care is also available for military retirees and their eligible dependents. Group on Educational Affairs (GEA) supplements the care provided by two full-time military emergency physician and physicians' assistants. All physicians staffed at Winn are board-certified in Emergency Medicine.

Individuals with a valid Military identification card and who are enrolled in Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) are eligible for primary care at Winn. The availability of care is based on TRICARE categories. The order of access is:

- Active-duty service members
- Active-duty family members enrolled in TRICARE Prime
- Retirees and their family members enrolled in Prime
- Active-duty family members not enrolled in Prime
- All others

No Shows -- Missed appointments compromise our ability to provide you quality care and hinder our ability to meet TRICARE access standards. If you are not able to make your appointment, please call 912-767-6633 to cancel. When services are unavailable at WACH patients will be referred off-post to a Tricare approved healthcare provider. All referrals must be approved by Tricare before patient receives care.

Dental Care

Dental care, including preventive dentistry, general dentistry, oral surgery, periodontics, pedodontics, removable prosthodontics, fixed prosthodontics, and endodontics, is available from the three Dental Treatment Facilities at Fort Stewart and one facility at Hunter Army Airfield.

Dental Clinics include:

- Dental Clinic 1, located in Building 440 next to the Fort Stewart Arts and Craft Shop/div>
- Dental Clinic 2, located on the second floor in Winn Army Community Hospital
- Dental Clinic 4, located on the corner of Gulick Avenue and 13th Street, Fort Stewart

Dental care for active-duty military personnel is available at these clinics, depending on the individual's unit of assignment. Dental clinics are for soldiers' use only.

Dental care for family members at the DENTAC is on an extremely limited basis only. Under DoD regulations, family members of active-duty sponsors with two or more years remaining (one year if returning 89from OCONUS) on active duty are eligible for enrollment in the TRICARE Family Member Dental Plan and must receive their care through private sector dental offices.

Care for those eligible is limited to "backup" emergency care in which a civilian provider has not been able to provide the necessary treatment. Family members not eligible for the insurance plan have been authorized to receive emergency services and limited space-available care on a standby basis.

If you need help understanding your healthcare plan, contact the health benefits advisor or Tricare. A Tricare office is located on post, across the street from WACH in building 202.

For emergencies, WACH is the closest on-post emergency room and off-post you may go to WACH or Liberty Regional Hospital in Hinesville depending on distance.

Health Care - Special Needs

Exceptional Family Member Program

The [Exceptional Family Member Program](#) (EFMP) is mandatory for all family members who have been identified with a special medical or educational need. Enrolling in the EFMP ensures that the family member's medical needs will be considered during the assignment coordination process.

Military Treatment Facility

The clinics and services available at [Military Treatment Facilities](#) vary by location. Before you move, identify the MTF that will serve you, visit the MTF's website to learn about the clinics and services available and to get relevant contact information.

Moving to a New TRICARE Region

If you anticipate a move to another [TRICARE region](#), work with your local TRICARE Service Center (TSC) or case manager before your move to ensure the transition is as smooth as possible. On arrival at the new duty location, your sponsor should contact the Beneficiary Counseling and Assistance Coordinator (BCAC) or TSC to ensure the transition plans are in place and to obtain authorizations for TRICARE [Extended Care Health Option](#) (ECHO) services, if applicable.

Beneficiary Counseling and Assistance Coordinator (BCAC)

All TRICARE Regional Offices and most MTFs are staffed with [BCACs](#) (formerly known as Health Benefits Advisors.) [BCACs](#) provide information, guidance and assistance on benefit options, TRICARE Prime enrollment, special authorizations, status of claims and eligibility, plus assistance with referrals and appointments. If you or your family member has a more severe medical need, contact your assigned [case manager](#).

Case Management

Case management involves a team of health care professionals who help you and your family to find solutions to complex health problems. It is important to inform your case manager if you are moving as he/she will connect you with the case manager at your new location.

Extended Care Health Option (ECHO)

TRICARE [ECHO](#) provides financial assistance to beneficiaries of active duty service members who qualify based on specific mental or physical disabilities. ECHO offers an integrated set of services and supplies beyond the basic TRICARE program. ECHO is administered by regional contractors in the TRICARE North, South, and West Regions and by TRICARE Regional Offices in overseas locations.

Transporting Medical Equipment

Your [Installation Transportation Office](#) has special procedures to follow for the transportation of medical equipment that is necessary for medical treatment required by the sponsor or family member. Some types of medical equipment may be shipped in the same manner as Professional Books, Papers, and Equipment (PBP&E).

Federal and State Health Care Programs

Medicaid - [Medicaid](#) pays for medical assistance for certain individuals and families with low incomes and resources. State Medicaid programs are usually administered by departments of social service or departments of medical assistance.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) - [SSI](#) is a cash assistance program intended to meet basic needs for food, clothing and shelter for those who are aged, blind or disabled. It provides cash to meet basic needs for food, clothing, and shelter. Families must reapply upon each move to another state.

Title V of the Social Security Act - Many states have services for children with special health care needs that are funded by the Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant, or [Title V](#). State departments of health web sites and local health departments will provide information on state health benefits for children with special health care needs. The Maternal and Child Health Bureaus' web site has Title V information organized by State that provide you with [Title V points of contact](#) and other pertinent information.

Other Important Resources

Debt Collection Assistance Officer (DCAO) - TRICARE has a [DCAO](#) assigned to TRICARE Regional Offices and MTFs worldwide to help beneficiaries understand and get assistance with debt collection problems related to TRICARE. Individuals who have received a notice from a collection agency or a negative credit report because of a medical or dental bill should be referred to the nearest [DCAO](#).

Family Voices - [Family Voices](#) is a national, grassroots clearinghouse for information and education concerning the health care of children with special health needs. Family Voices also has [State points of contacts](#) with useful links to State programs and organizations.

Installation Specific Information

Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP)

An Exceptional Family Member (EFM) is one with any physical, emotional, developmental, or intellectual disability which requires special treatment, therapy, education, training, or counseling.

EFMP works with other military and civilian agencies to provide comprehensive and coordinated medical, education, housing, community support, and personnel services to families with special needs.

Enrollment in EFMP is mandatory whether the EFM is an adult or a child. Enrollment in EFMP does not adversely affect selection for promotion, schools, or assignment. Information concerning enrollment is not made available to selection boards.

Enrollment allows assignment managers at Army personnel agencies to consider the documented medical and special education needs of a soldier's EFM during the assignment process. When possible, soldiers are assigned to an area where the medical and special education needs of their EFM can be met. This is dependent on a valid personnel requirement for the soldier's grade, specialty, and eligibility for the tour.

All soldiers are still eligible for world wide assignments.

Special education needs are considered outside the United States only. Assignments within the fifty states and Trust Territories are not based on the educational needs of children. Every local school system must obey public laws regarding the provision of special education.

Child and Youth Programs

General Information

The Department of Defense (DoD) and the Military Services take great pride in the variety and quality of services provided to children and youth on installations worldwide. While the services provided depend on the size of the location, the standards and quality of services are consistent and meet established regulations. The network has hundreds of locations worldwide serving over 1.3 million children.

Child Development Centers (CDC)

These facilities generally offer child care for children ages six weeks to 5 years old. Care is typically available weekdays from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. CDCs vary in size; the average CDC cares for about 200 children. All programs must be certified by the DoD and accredited by a national accrediting body such as the [National Association for the Education of Young Children](#).

In-Home Childcare

With in-home childcare, children receive their care in the private home of a certified provider living in government-owned or leased housing or in state-licensed homes in the community. Family child care provides accommodating child care arrangements, including night, weekend, and flexible hourly care for shift work.

In-home childcare programs offer comparable care to a CDC. Providers must be certified by the DoD, and some seek additional accreditation from the National Association of Family Child Care (NAFCC). Regulations limit the number of children that may be cared for at one time: no more than six children under age eight, and no more than two charges under two years old.

School-age care (SAC)

DoD School-Age Care (SAC) programs are offered for children, kindergarten to 12 years of age before and/or after school, during holidays, and summer vacations. Emphasis is placed on SAC programs which meet community needs, reinforce family values, and promote the cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development of children. SAC may be provided in DoD Youth Centers, Child Development Centers or other suitable facilities. To expand school-age care spaces, DoD policy encourages use of youth centers; on-and off-base schools, and other suitable facilities such as community centers. Accreditation of DoD SAC programs is a requirement. Accreditation sets the professional standards for after school programs and helps families identify high-quality programs.

Waiting List

Due to a high demand for care, you may be placed on a wait list. Your position on the wait list depends on many factors that are at the discretion of the installation and may include your husband's military status, the date you apply, deployment and your employment. If these factors change while you are on the wait list, your position will be changed accordingly, so it is important that you keep your information up-to-date.

Child care is not an entitlement, and fees are income-based. Fees throughout the child development system of care fall into fee ranges set by DoD.

To apply for child care, fill out [DD Form 2652, Application for Department of Defense Child Care Fees](#) and [DD Form 2606, the Department of Defense Child Development Program Request for Care Record](#) and return them to the Resource and Referral (R&R) office at your installation.

Youth Programs

The Department of Defense has a long history of providing positive youth programs that focus on alternative activities for youth during out-of-school hours. Today, DoD continues to be committed to youth by providing consistent guidance and stable and dynamic programs in more than 350 youth programs worldwide. DoD promotes positive youth development by designing programs to recognize the achievements of youth and by developing partnerships with other youth-serving organizations like the Boys & Girls Clubs of America and 4-H that offer a variety of resources. Programs for teens and pre-teens vary from one base to another, but are governed by a consistent DoD instruction. Programs prepare young people to meet the challenges of adolescence and adulthood through a coordinated, progressive series of activities and experiences that help them become socially, emotionally, physically and cognitively competent. Programs usually include physical fitness and sports, arts and recreation, training in leadership, life skills and career/volunteer opportunities, mentoring, intervention and support services.

Child Care

Child Development Services (CDS)

CDS programs on Fort Stewart have received Department of Defense certification.

Eligibility

Services offered to children (six weeks to kindergarten) of soldiers and retirees, and of DoD employees as well as Army civilian employees.

Registration

To register for child care or any Child Youth and Schools Services program, all children must have up-to-date immunizations, a health examination, completed health and registration cards and completed Purified Protein Derivative (PPD). You will also need proof of income (military LES and/or spouse's pay stub).

Child Development Center (CDC)

The Fort Stewart CDC is located in Building 403 and can be reached by calling 912-767-3203.

Hours of Operation -- The center is open 6:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Programs Offered

Following is a list of programs offered at the Fort Stewart CDC:

- Full Day Care- offers developmental services to children 6 weeks to 5 years of age for working parents requiring childcare on a regular basis. Services for children 4 weeks of age are available for sole and dual military parents.
- Hourly Care- short term care on an intermittent basis/span
- Pre-K Program- The free Georgia state funded program offers developmental services 6 ½ hours a day for children to attain readiness skills for school.
- Respite Care
- Wrap Around Pre-K- regularly scheduled before and after school care for preschool children
- Special Needs Care

Currently there are three Child Development Centers, One Pre-K Center, several Family Childcare providers and Numerous School Age programs to choose from.

Free Services offered During/for Deployment

- Childcare on the 1st Saturday of the month from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Reservations must be made 2 weeks in advance.
- Childcare at Newman Gym for 1 hour a day between the hours of 8:30-10:30 a.m. or 4:00-6:00 p.m., available Monday- Friday. Parent must be in Gym during childcare. Space is limited to 10 children and is on a first come, first serve basis.
- Childcare during predeployment/ deployment briefings

Discounted Services for Families of Deployed Soldiers

- Free instructional and enrichment classes for youth: up to eight weeks at no cost.
- Team or individual sports fee waiver for two sports, per child, annually.
- 20% fee reduction for children of deployed soldiers enrolled in regular full day/part day schedule.
- Hourly Care: provide at \$2 per hour per child

To take advantage of free services, children must be registered with Child and Youth Services (CYS) and have up to date shot records. Registration is free.

Family Child Care (FCC)

The FCC program offers quarters-based care provided by certified military family members from housing located on and off the Installation. The care provided is regulated by the U.S. Army and both the individual and the homes are certified by CYS before children may be enrolled.

FCC provides a smaller family environment for full-day, part-day, hourly, extended and long-term care. FCC can also address special needs children and newborn infants. Any family member residing in quarters who provides child care to unrelated children for more than 10 child care hours per week on a regular basis must be certified. Unauthorized child care in government housing may result in loss of government housing privileges. For more information call the FCC Director at 912-767-2311.

Youth Services

Youth Services

To participate in any programs offered, children must be registered with CYS Central Registration Office at Building 443. When registered, the child will receive a membership card. Registration is free.

School Age Services

The School Age Services (SAS) Program provides age-appropriate recreational and educational activities for 1st thru 5th graders, before and after school. The program is offered 6:00 a.m. - 8:30 a.m., 2:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. during the school year and Full Day Care, 6:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m., is offered when school is not in session.

Children enrolled in the program are supervised and are involved in a variety of activities including arts and crafts, cooking, dancing, painting, sports, movies, exercise and field trips to local points of interest. A quiet time is also incorporated into the program during which children may relax or do homework. Various programs will utilize Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) facilities, as well as local recreational sites and parks.

Youth Center

The Youth Center is the place to go for youths, 6th grade thru 12th grade, to enjoy activities such as billiards, bumper pool, foosball, Sega, Nintendo games, table games, dances, contests, special events, tournaments, theme parties and cultural events.

A shuttle Bus is provided from different locations within the on-post housing area to the Youth center. The bus runs on Saturdays and school holidays starting at 4:00 p.m. To get a bus stop schedule or more information, call 912-767-4491.

Youth Recreation and Sports

- Instructional Programs- includes Dance (ages 3-19), Gymnastics (ages 4-19), Piano (ages 5-19), Tae Kwon Do (ages 5-19), and Swimming (ages 0-18) with fees ranging from \$30-\$40 per month (some programs may have additional fees for uniform/attire).
- Youth Developmental Programs- includes Youth Sponsorship, Teen councils, Career Explorations, Boys and Girls Club, Boys and Girl Scouts, Community Service, Support Groups, 4-H Club, Computer Lab and Homework Center
- Summer Programs- Swim lessons, weight training, sports camps, Camp Adventure, dance, gymnastics, crafts classes, piano lessons and tae kwon do are just some of the activities offered. Registration for the summer program begins in May and activities begin in mid-June.

New Parent Support Program

General Program Description

The Army New Parent Support Program (NPSP) provides intensive home visiting services to eligible Families with children prenatal to 3 years old whether they live on or off the installation. Activities and services provided include information and referral to military and civilian programs that support parents of infants and young children, such as parenting programs, respite care for children, and supervised play time for children. All activities and services provided through NPSP are voluntary and non-stigmatizing and emphasize the parents' strengths.

Goals of the Army NPSP are:

1. Contribute to mission readiness.
2. Support Family member adaptation to military life.
3. Enhance the knowledge and skills Family members need to form healthy relationships and provide safe, nurturing environments for children to prevent Family violence.
4. Foster a supportive military community for young military Families.

Staff Qualifications

NPSP Home Visitor staff consists of Licensed Clinical Social Workers and Registered Nurses. All personnel will possess the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary for their professional certification/licensure and positions. Local installation or State background checks, including Army Central Registry checks, will be completed on all personnel who provide services to parents and their children and will be updated annually.

Eligibility Requirements

Families may be self-referred or referred by other agencies such as health care providers, chaplains, social service staff, command, or Family Advocacy Program (FAP) staff.

How to Enroll

Interested families may contact the local Army Community Service (ACS) office, or their health care provider, for further information in the New Parent Support Program.

Installation Specific Information

Army Community Service New Parent Support Program

New Parent Support Standard -- A pre and post natal program providing support, education, and referral to services for parents during pregnancy and for three months after.

New Parent Support Plus -- Social workers provide in-home supportive and caring services for parents of children birth through age 5.

Baby Basic Training -- program for expectant fathers that provides information and hands on training to ready then for fatherhood. This is a class for men taught by a man.

Active Parenting Now -- parents of 5-12 year olds learn discipline strategies, communication and problem solving skills in this 6 session program.

Infant Massage -- hands-on workshop for parents of infants birth to age 1 to learn massage techniques that are known to be helpful in relieving colic symptoms, assisting in parent child bonding, relieving stress for parent and child, stimulating infant circulatory system and much more.

Heroes at Home

This is an educational support program for military families with children prenatal to 36 months. Services include:

The goal of this program is to support and assist families in providing their child(ren) opportunities for optimal development. Their services include:

- Psychological services
- Speech and Language Therapy

Soldiers must enroll the child/children with special needs into the Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP) at Army Community Service (ACS), building 87. The EFMP program manager will provide resource and referral information to the parents.

Family Center

Programs and Services

A key resource on your installation and a gateway to accessing all of the resources available to you, the Army Community Services provides information, support and services to help you balance the demands of family and the military lifestyle. The Army Community Services is one part of the overall installation family support system, which is the network of agencies, programs, services, partnerships and individuals that supports your personal and family life readiness, mobilization and deployment readiness, and mobility and economic readiness. The Army Community Services should be one of you first stops upon arriving at an installation; its programs and services will be an important resource for you and your family.

Deployment Readiness -- Assists you during all phases of the deployment cycle. We provide programs and services to individual soldiers, civilians, and family members throughout the deployment process. We educate you on what to expect and the best ways to prepare.

Relocation Readiness -- Provides information, referral, resources and tools to help you with permanent change of station (PCS) moves and post-move orientations. We maintain a loan closet from which families may borrow basic household goods. We also assist you with in-transit emergencies by providing classes on move-related topics such as buying or selling homes and individual PCS planning, among others. We serve as liaison to citizenship, immigration, and multicultural diversity information, and provide outreach to waiting families.

Personal Financial Readiness -- A program to assist you in sustaining financial self-sufficiency. You can learn more about debt liquidation, thrift savings plans, consumer and credit issues, and predatory lending.

Employment Readiness -- The training and information provided can help you identify and reach your employment and career development goals, manage the challenges associated with a mobile lifestyle and develop job search skills. Assists you in acquiring skills, networks, and resources that will allow you to participate in the work force and to develop a career/work plan.

Family Life Education -- Provides you with information and education about a variety of life cycle issues, including parenting and relationships, among others, to help you strengthen your relationships.

Information and Referral -- An integral function of the family center, information and referral services can assist you in locating needed services and programs available on your installation, through civilian agencies in the local community, and connect to national resources.

Army Community Services may also provide other services, such as counseling, family advocacy, fitness and recreation programs and Exceptional Family Member support. Services vary by location.

Employment - Overview

Employment Options

Job opportunities are greatly limited as to the type and salary. Jobs are more plentiful in Savannah, Brunswick, Statesboro and surrounding areas. Good employment prospects are Registered Nurse, Licensed Practical Nurse, Social Services, Construction, Physical Security, Teaching, Food Service, Warehouse and Management. Fair employment prospects are administrative, Engineering, Sales, Data Entry. Poor Employment Prospects are in teen employment. Georgia's unemployment rate is 4.1% and minimum wage is \$5.85.

ACS Employment Readiness Program

Soldiers, DA civilian employees, spouses, retirees, surviving spouses, and family members (to include youth), are eligible and highly encouraged to participate free of charge. A professional Job Search Trainer will help you identify your immediate and long range career goals. Based on your needs assessment an Individual Career Plan will be developed to help ensure that you receive the necessary assistance. Employment Readiness will provide job search training, but it's not a job placement service. A professional Job Search Trainer will help you identify your skills and assist you every step of the way during your job search. You'll also have access to valuable references on the national job market and be able to attend seminars and workshops on job search strategies, interview skills, and salary negotiation. A resource center containing computers are available for preparing letters and resumes. The ACS Employment Readiness Program (ERP) provides individual screening and referrals for job vacancies. The program maintains a job bank of current, unique, and ongoing employment opportunities. Other services include:

Civilian Personnel Advisory Center (CPAC)

The Appropriated Funds (AF) and Non-Appropriated Funds (NAF) offices are located in the CPAC office, which is located in the Soldier Service Center, building 253. They provide job listings for federal jobs and instruct interested applicants on how to apply. Department of Labor

Other Sources

Contracting positions available for solicitation can be obtained at the contracting office located at building 621 on William H. Wilson Road Fort Stewart. To apply for positions at the commissary or any of the Army and Air Force Exchange (AAFES) facilities, openings are listed and applications are taken on their respective websites which can be found in the Contacts section. Job announcements are also available in the post newspaper, the Frontline and the local newspaper, The Coastal Courier.

Employment Documentation

For job hunting purposes, be sure to hand carry all employment records and documents such as, resumes, Standard Form (SF) 50, college transcripts, certificates and licenses. Any other documentation pertinent to employment should also be hand carried.

Unemployment Benefits

Eligibility for benefits is determined based on past wages, reason for job separation, and availability and job search requirements. Claims for unemployment insurance may be filed at any Georgia Department of Labor Career Center. When filing a claim, you should bring:

- Your social security number. A claim cannot be filed without a social security number.
- Employer-issued separation letter or notice, if one was provided.
- Names and addresses of all employers for the last 18 months and the dates worked for each.
- Proof of immigration status if not a U.S. citizen.
- Personal check with account number and bank routing number if you want benefits deposited directly into to a checking or savings account.
- Claims are effective on the date they are filed and are not retroactive to the last day worked.

Transition Assistance

Transition assistance is available through the Army Career and Alumni Program (ACAP) which is located at the Soldier Service Center, building 253. The program assists soldiers, eligible family members, Department of the Army civilians transitioning from active duty to the civilian workforce. Services include:

- Benefits counseling
- Job search assistance
- Job search workshops
- Employer recruitment visits
- Job fairs

Relocation Assistance

Programs and Services

While moving is always stressful, your stress can be drastically reduced if you take full advantage of the information, education, and personal assistance provided to you by the Relocation Program. This is the place to find answers and get referral to other installation resources as well as assistance with in-transit emergencies. The most important thing you can do to ensure a smooth move is to start planning early using the many Relocation Assistance program services and tools available.

Individual PCS Planning -- Most relocation programs offer one-on-one consultation for anyone needing assistance. In particular those making their first military move, first overseas move, or those with challenging and complex situations such as special needs family members or financial problems should call the Relocation Program for an appointment.

Military Installations and Plan My Move -- For managing and planning your move, use these two DoD sponsored web-based relocation tools with information on over 250 installations worldwide. You can estimate expenses, find the forms necessary for housing and household goods, keep a calendar of events and take other necessary actions to ensure a successful move.

Loan Closet -- Basic household goods items are available to borrow while waiting for your personal property pre-departure or upon arrival. The typical items in stock include: pots and pans, dishes, silverware, irons, ironing boards, portacribs, high chairs, and infant/toddler car seats. Generally, towels and bed linens are not available, so these should be packed in your hold baggage.

Workshops and Briefings -- The classes offered vary from installation to installation but you can generally find classes on buying, selling and renting smart, budgeting and finance, moving with children, general moving preparation and many other moving related topics.

Pre-departure Briefings -- Sometimes called Smooth Move or PCS Briefings, you and your spouse will want to attend for sure. These briefings provide essential information that can prevent you from making uninformed and costly decisions before your move.

Settling-in Services -- These may include welcome wagon services, local area tours with childcare often provided, or basic household items to use until your goods arrive. Overseas arrival services may include introductory language classes and cultural awareness training.

Deployment Support -- The Family Center assists unit family readiness groups and Ombudsman programs during the entire deployment cycle. Support includes services for special needs, classes on deployment preparation, managing finances, helping children adjust, family separation, return and reunion, and information on resources available locally and on-line.

Foreign Born Spouse Support -- Whether your question concerns immigration and naturalization, learning the English language or how to take local transportation, the Relocation Program provides assistance, classes and referrals.

Emergency Assistance -- From time-to-time emergencies occur while moving, the Relocation Program office has the resources to provide emergency financial assistance and referrals.

Transition Assistance -- This is a mandatory program available to assist personnel and family members when they separate from the military. The Relocation Assistance office will establish your individual transition plan and refer you to all the installation and community resources necessary to complete a successful transition.

Installation Specific Information

Relocation Programs and Activities

Sponsorship Program- All Soldiers, E-5 through O-6, and married Soldiers if possible will be provided an advanced-arrival sponsor. A reactionary sponsor will be provided to married Soldiers without advanced-arrival sponsors and single Soldier, E-1 through E-4.

Lending Closet- basic household items are available for loan. Bring copy of orders and I.D. card to check out items.

Post Orientation and Tour -- One hour tour every Tuesday and Thursday at 9:00 a.m., in the Soldier Service Center, Building 253. Bus goes by on and off post locations. Free childcare is provided for this activity. Contact ACS Outreach at 912-767-9176, in advance if childcare is needed. Please register in advance with the Outreach office to attend the orientation and tour.

Hearts Apart (Waiting Spouses Support Group) -- Group meets every 1st and 3rd Wednesday, 11:00 a.m. at Building 443, The Leisure Activities Center. Group is for spouses who are geographically separated from their service member. Get together with other spouses to enjoy arts and crafts, personal development, and receive information on community events.

Foreign Born Spouses Support Group -- Come out to get together with people of similar culture and/or who may speak the same language. For more information on the Foreign Born Spouses Support Group contact ACS. Contact ACS at 912-767-2500 for more information or to start a new group. Mandatory Overseas Briefings -- If you are on orders to an overseas assignment, a mandatory overseas briefing is required. Germany and Korea briefings are held the 1st Tuesday of each month at 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. respectively and Alaska and Hawaii briefing are held the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. respectively. All other briefings are held by appointment.

Kids On the Move -- Whether you are just getting here or getting ready to leave, bring your children by the Relocation Assistance Office for an activity bag to keep them occupied while they are getting settled in or traveling to the next duty station. Program is offered on a walk-in basis during normal business hours.

Loan Closet

Items Available

The Loan Closet at Fort Stewart provides basic survival items (pots and pans, sleeping mats, etc.) that can be checked out to use while household goods are in transit. Please note: we do not provide linens.

How to Borrow

To check out items a copy of PCS orders and a military ID card are required. Time is limited to thirty days with one extension of thirty days granted when requested. If only an ID card is presented, time is limited to 14 days. The Loan Closet is located at Building 443, the Leisure Activity Center. Hours of Operation are from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Contact the Lending Closet at 912-767-2500 for more information.

Financial Assistance

ACS Financial Readiness Program

The ACS Financial Readiness Program focuses on improving the client's personal financial skills, such as budget development and financial planning. It also provides informational services on developing a spending plan, managing personal finances, evaluating assets and liabilities, and improving a client's ability to perform as an informed consumer.

Cost of Living

Cost of Living in Hinesville, Georgia and Georgia in general is lower than the national average meaning it is an affordable place to live. There is no Cost of living Allowance (COLA) for Fort Stewart, Georgia. Temporary Lodging Expense (TLE) is authorized for a limited amount of time. Contact the finance office for procedures dealing with TLE.

Guest quarters on post have 2 full beds and are \$44 per night. Each room has an additional charge of \$5 per night per guest over 1 year of age and a nonrefundable fee of \$45 for pets and an additional charge of \$3 per night per pet. Hotels in the area have an average cost of about \$75 per night for one room with two double beds. Average costs for renting ranges from low 400's to lower 1200's depending on size and type of housing. Purchasing a home averages from \$35,000 to \$850,000 depending on size and type. Average monthly utility payments can be as high as \$450.

The state of Georgia requires motor vehicle owners and lessees to maintain continuous mandatory liability insurance coverage of at least the minimum limits in order to drive on Georgia roads or highways. The minimum liability limits set by the state are bodily injury liability of \$25,000 per person, \$50,000 per occurrence and property damage liability of \$25,000 per occurrence.

Other Considerations

Emergency assistance during transit may be needed. If so, call Red Cross at 1-877-272-7337. If you have a medical emergency, go to the nearest hospital for treatment. If the emergency will delay your arrival to check-in at Fort Stewart, contact the Reception Center at 912-767-0113 for assistance and to let them know of your situation.

Another possible solution to financial hardship is to draw Advanced Pay when you get to your receiving duty station. When taking this option into consideration, you must realize that the payments to repay the advanced pay will be automatically deducted from your military pay, reducing future pay for several months.

Emergency Assistance

Planning for Emergencies

Emergency Financial Assistance is in the form of an interest free loan and/or grant, if the applicant qualifies. There is also information on a Scholarship Program for Dependent Children. Civilian Employees are not eligible for Army Emergency Relief (AER). Emergency assistance through AER can be obtained at the Army Community Service (ACS), Bldg 86 Monday - Friday 7:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. If emergency assistance is needed after hours, weekends, and holidays or if you are not near an AER office, the Red Cross can assist you and can be contacted at 877-272-7337.

AER can assist with:

- Rent
- Initial rent and deposit
- Utilities
- Food
- Loss of funds
- Dental/medical expenses
- POV repair
- Car/Insurance payments
- Emergency travel
- Funeral expenses
- Emergency shelter

AER is unauthorized to assist with:

- Ordinary leave/vacation
- Fines/ legal expenses
- Home purchase/ improvement
- Purchase/ rent/ lease of a vehicle
- Cover return checks
- Credit card payments or debt liquidation
- Telephone bills

The Salvation Army

The Salvation Army provides housing, utility, medical, food and other types of emergency assistance. For assistance, call 912-651-7420. They also operate a thrift store at 431 General Screven Way, Hinesville, Georgia. Hours of operation are Monday thru Friday 9:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and Saturday 9:30 am- 4 pm.

Legal Assistance

Legal Services

The services available to Soldiers, their Families and Retirees fall into two broad categories-Legal Assistance and Claims.

The Legal Assistance Office provides legal advice on a wide variety of legal issues. These include, estate planning, wills, powers of attorneys, adoption, divorce, child support, child custody, immigration and naturalization, security clearance revocations and suspension, consumer law, credit and indebtedness, probating estates, assistance to the Families of Fallen Soldiers and Wounded Soldiers. A complete list of services may be found in Army Regulation AR 27-3. Legal Assistance does not provide advice on military justice issues, employer-employees issues and only very limited advice on bankruptcy. Some issues can be handled on a walk-in basis such as Power of Attorney, Ad Valorem Tax forms and Notarizations. Other issues are taken by appointment only which include wills and activities requiring an attorney.

The Claims Office receives claims against the Government for damage to household goods during moves and other claims Soldiers and Family Members may have against the Government. The main office is located in Building 621, Suite 201. If you have lost or damaged items from your move, take form DD 1840 (Joint Statement of Loss or Damage at Delivery), that was received upon delivery of household goods, to the claims office and they will in return give you a packet to fill out and directions on how to fill the packet out correctly to file a claim.

Deployment Support

Family Deployment Support

The Mobilization and Deployment program is here to build resilient Military Families. The program's primary mission is to ensure commanders, Soldiers, and Family Members are prepared for all cycles of the deployment phase. The program provides training to Rear Detachment Teams, Family Readiness Group Leaders, and unit points of contacts to allow them to better help Soldiers and Families. The program also provides deployment and reunion briefings as well as operates a Family Assistance Center during times of deployment, emergencies, and natural disasters.

The Fort Stewart Family Readiness Center (FRC) is 5000 square feet of family friendly space. The FRC serves as a "hub" for Family events on Fort Stewart. At any given time, a variety of activities are taking place at the FRC. Families utilizing computers with internet access and video-cams, Family Readiness Group Training, Community Mayors volunteering their time, Army family Team Building classes, or many appreciation ceremonies and special events to celebrate volunteers and Families are just a few activities that are held at the FRC.
